


CBI e-Bulletin December 2020

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The Divine Service in Revelation

I've been teaching the book of Revelation lately, which is well-known for its rich symbolism and many vivid scenes of cosmic judgment and restoration. While the contents of the book are typically (and rightly, I should add) associated with heaven and the end times, I was struck recently by how *grounded* John's first vision in the book actually is.

Before any details of the vision are given, John first wants us to know that he is our "brother and partner in the tribulation and the kingdom and the patient endurance that are in Jesus..." (1:9). John may have been the one to experience the visions of Revelation firsthand, but he wants us to know that he's *with us* in a very meaningful way throughout what follows. As we'll see below, John is in some way representative of all believers in Christ.

John then informs us—again, before the vision is recounted—that he was "in the Spirit on the Lord's day" (1:10). While the upcoming vision may be jarring, it's important to keep in mind that it happens on the Lord's day, the day of worship. Why?

When John turns to "see the voice" that was speaking to him, the first thing John sees is "seven golden lampstands" (1:12). That's pretty remarkable, I think, because we'll soon learn from Christ himself that "the seven lampstands are the seven churches" (1:20). The very first thing that John sees in the book of Revelation, then, is the church, and again, this happens on the Lord's day. It's as if John is being instructed to keep the church firmly in mind when he sees what follows.

And that is this: "in the midst of the lampstands one like a son of man, clothed with a long robe and with a golden sash around his chest" (1:13). Fascinating! John first sees the church, and then immediately afterwards sees the Son of Man not in the distant heavens but "in the midst [lit., *middle*]" of the church, tending to it as its priest (robe/sash) and reigning over it as its king (gold), from Lord's day to Lord's day (see also Rev. 2:1, 5).

John continues: "When I saw him, I fell at his feet as though dead" (1:17). This, of course, has been the posture of the church throughout the ages, confessing the temporal and eternal death deserved because of sin. But the very moment that confession happens, "he laid his right hand on me, saying, 'Fear not, I am the first and the last, and the living one. I died, and behold I am alive forevermore, and I have the keys of Death and Hades" (1:17–18).

After falling at the Son of Man's feet (which alone implies that he is very close to John indeed!), the Son of Man then makes physical contact with John; "he laid his right hand on me." So it is that after we confess our sins in the Divine Service, Christ continues to make physical contact with us, too, by means of his very body and blood.

John's first vision certainly is quite lofty, but there's plenty in it that grounds it right in the Divine Service. Revelation may reveal all sorts of things that will take place in the end times, but it's also depicting how heaven meets earth right now, from Lord's day to Lord's day, until that final day of the Lord which has no end.


