

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The Divine Service in Revelation: Part 2

A couple months ago I wrote a brief piece on "The Divine Service in Revelation" in which I focused on how John's first vision of the Son of Man in Revelation 1 seems to be grounded in various ways in the church's liturgy. One reader has since asked: "Where else does the 'Divine Service' appear in the book of Revelation?" In short, I think it's all over the book!

Let's consider one more example, this time from chapter 10. To summarize briefly what happens up to this point: John experiences a magnificent, heavenly throne room in chapters 4 and 5 and learns that God is holding a scroll in his right hand that can be opened only by the Lamb (Rev. 5:7). One by one the Lamb opens six of the scroll's seven seals in chapter 6, and after a brief "interlude" in chapter 7, where John sees a vision of the one church that lives on both heaven and earth, the seventh seal is opened and it stirs up seven trumpets. Much like the seven seals, the first six trumpets, in chapters 8 and 9, bring us to yet another "interlude" before the seventh one blows (Rev. 11:15–19), and this time the focus is on what happens to John.

He writes: "Then I saw another mighty angel coming down from heaven, wrapped in a cloud, with a rainbow over his head, and his face was like the sun, and his legs like pillars of fire. He had a little scroll open in his hand" (Rev. 10:1–2). Notice how similar this "angel" is to the Son of Man in chapter 1: "wrapped (lit., "clothed") in a cloud" (see 1:13, 7), a face like the sun (see 1:16), legs like pillars of fire (see 1:14–15), and he's holding something in his right hand (see 1:16, 17, 20).

John continues: "And the angel whom I saw standing on the sea and on the land raised

his right hand to heaven and swore by him who lives forever and ever...that there would be no more delay, but that in the days of the trumpet call to be sounded by the seventh angel, the mystery of God would be fulfilled, just as he announced to his servants the prophets" (Rev. 10:5–7). We learn in the next chapter that "the mystery of God" has to do with how Christians are to bear witness to the Gospel before the last day. They are, for example, to speak the word (see Rev. 11:3, 6, 10), and even if that witness causes death, the Lord stands ready to give them a breath (lit., "spirit") of new life (Rev. 11:11).

What this means for chapter 10 is that something is about to happen to John that is at the heart and center of the Christian witness. And it looks like this: "Then the voice that I had heard from heaven spoke to me again, saying, 'Go, take the scroll that is open in the hand of the angel who is standing on the sea and on the land.' So I went to the angel and told him to give me the little scroll. And he said to me, 'Take and eat it..." (Rev. 10:8–9). John consumes the scroll given to him, and immediately afterwards he's told, "You must again prophesy about many peoples and nations and languages and kings" (Rev. 10:11).

Fascinating! Everything associated with the Son of Man—sun, cloud, rainbow, divine clothing—all things far *above* our own reason and strength!—comes right down to John. The heavenly scroll that no one but the Lamb could open is now not only opened but also extended right into John's mouth for consumption (again, "*Take and eat*"). Then John "must again" speak God's word, and even if this leads to death, he is promised new life (see esp. Rev. 11:11).

Does this sound familiar? The One who is heavenly, high, and holy deigns to dwell with us most lowly (LSB 636). We are given the Word—or should I say Scroll—made flesh in the Lord's Supper, told to "Take and eat," and then are sent back again and again into the world. This is the essence of the Christian witness, and even in the face of death, whether to the self or to the world, God promises a spirit of new life each and every Lord's day. Remember how John phrased his own introduction to the book: "I was in the Spirit on the Lord's day" (1:10). And we are too. Thanks be to God!
