


CBI e-Bulletin January 2017

Ask Dr. Saleska

To ask Dr. Saleska a question, please visit the "Ask Dr. Saleska" page on CBI's website and he will get back to you.

Question:

How can there be degrees of glory in heaven? Where is this mentioned in the Bible? How can there be degrees of perfect? Won't that cause jealousy to see others with a higher degree of glory? The whole concept boggles my mind. Any clarification would be appreciated.

Answer:

Here are a few thoughts on the "degrees of glory" question.

First of all it is important to distinguish between the two terms "bliss" and "glory." There are no degrees of "bliss" since all the saints will see God and live forever in his presence and in that respect will be equally blessed; however, since we know that God is just and fair, it only makes sense that he would reward people according to their faithfulness in this life, and the suffering they may have endured for the Gospel's sake. "Degrees of glory," therefore is understandable. As an example, in all fairness the Apostle Paul should be accorded greater glory than I because of his missionary journeys, writings, suffering for the Gospel, etc.

The following lengthy statement by Luther will help explain "degrees of glory' in heaven: "It is true there will be a difference in yonder life, according as they have labored and lived here. For example, St. Paul was an Apostle, Samuel or Isaiah a Prophet, etc. One will have greater brightness than the other because he worked or suffered more in his office...thus everyone will have his distinction and glory according to his office, and still one God and Lord will be in all, and one and the same joy and bliss. In his person none shall be more or have more than the other, St. Peter no more than you and I. None the less there must be differences because of the works. For God did not do through Paul what he did through Isaiah and vice versa. For that reason everyone will bring along his works, through which he will shine and praise God so that people will say: 'St. Peter has done more than I or another...' In short all are to be alike before God in faith and grace and celestial bliss, but they are to differ in their works and honor."

As far as jealousy is concerned, jealousy occurs because of our sinful condition. That condition will no longer exist in heaven. Therefore because of our sinless condition in heaven, when God makes those distinctions we will all agree that He is being just and fair in his decisions.

A couple of the passages used in this connection are the following: 2 Corinthians 9:6, speaking spiritually Paul writes, "But this I say, he which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly, he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."

I Corinthians 15:41-42, speaking of earthly bodies and heavenly bodies Paul writes, "There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars: for one star differs from another star in glory. So also is the resurrection of the dead..."

The idea is also found in Daniel 12:3, where the wise shall shine like the brightness of the stars.

There is more that could be written, but I hope the above will clarify the question somewhat.
