



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The Drunkenness of Noah

It's an odd story, isn't it? The account of Noah's ark may be a favorite for children's books and Hollywood movies, but what happens soon after the rainbow dissipates doesn't make the highlight reel.

It starts like this: "The sons of Noah who went forth from the ark were Shem, Ham, and Japheth. (Ham was the father of Canaan.) These three were the sons of Noah, and from these the people of the whole earth were dispersed" (Gen 9:18–19).

So far, so good. All of humanity will now derive from Shem, Ham, and Japheth. We'll return to this in a moment.

"Noah began to be a man of the soil, and he planted a vineyard. He drank of the wine and became drunk and lay uncovered in his tent" (Gen 9:20–21).

Scandalous! But does it sound familiar? Working the ground. Nakedness. Soon in the narrative we'll have a garment, and after that mention of a curse. We might be on the other side of the flood, but this turn of events sounds like a trip back to Eden.

To have a vineyard is to have a staple item of the promised land (see esp. Deut. 6:11). And while wine may be one of God's good gifts (Ps. 104:15), because of original sin, we can't even handle the good things anymore. Here's some food, but we'll eat too much. Here's some physical exercise, but we'll idolize our physical

health.

The story of Noah's drunkenness is our story: delivered from the flood of sin, death, and the devil, we soon chase after paradise on our own terms, only to be exposed for doing so. The refrain for tomorrow's Ash Wednesday service could very well be "Naked you were, and naked you shall return."

"And Ham, the father of Canaan, saw the nakedness of his father and told his two brothers outside. Then Shem and Japheth took a garment, laid it on both their shoulders, and walked backward and covered the nakedness of their father. Their faces were turned backward, and they did not see their father's nakedness" (Gen 9:22–23).

While Ham tells (literally "declares") the sin of his father to those on the "outside," the other two sons of Noah refuse to revel in it. They don't slander him, make excuses for him, or even say anything about him. Their top priority is *bringing a garment* to *the situation*, much like how God once clothed Adam and Eve in Eden. They walk by faith, and not by sight (2 Cor 5:7), just as we are called to do.

In Noah's three sons, then, are two different approaches to original sin: use it for one's own purposes, or bring a garment to it; there's no third option or neutral zone. The account of Noah's drunkenness bids us anew this Lenten journey to reflect on how we can best cover a particular sin—no matter how shameful, serious, or convoluted—with the garment of Christ's righteousness.

Naked we are, and naked we shall return, but "for as many of you as were baptized into Christ, you have been *clothed with Christ*" (Gal 3:27).


