


CBI e-Bulletin May 2021



The Ascension of Jesus

Christians all over the world will soon be observing the ascension of Jesus (May 13th), a profoundly important event for the church of all times and places that was once celebrated on par with Christmas and Easter. Why was that? Let's take a look at just some of the key details of the event as recorded in Acts 1:1–11 to find out...

Luke begins his account of the ascension like this: "In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen" (Acts 1:1–2).

First thing's first: Luke says that "the first book," the gospel of Luke, is a record of "all that Jesus began to do and teach." This will be huge not only for the ascension but also for the book of Acts as a whole: Jesus is not finished doing and teaching. We'll return to this point in a moment.

Luke then writes that "He [Jesus] presented himself alive to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God" (Acts 1:3).

A few things from this verse stand out. First, notice how Luke refers to Jesus' resurrection ("presented himself alive") and to his crucifixion ("after his suffering") in the same breath. Next, instead of describing Jesus' "many proofs" in more detail, Luke instead focuses on the fact that Jesus' "many" appearances featured "speaking about the kingdom of God." So it is that the risen Christ, who is and remains the crucified one, continues to teach his people. We'll return to this point, too, in a moment.

One last tidbit from the verse above that we just can't miss is the forty-day period over which this takes place. Why forty? Well, it tends to bring to mind several other biblical "forties," doesn't it? Events such as the flood, the Israelite journey through the wilderness, and Jesus' temptation by the devil all make the list. The number forty connotes a set period of trial and affliction, yes, but also a <u>set period</u>; it won't last forever. We will be kept safe; we will be victorious; we will reach our promised land.

Finally, notice which details Luke prioritizes as he describes the actual ascension: "And when he [Jesus] had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a *cloud* took him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9).

That's fascinating! Of all the ways to ascend—A fiery chariot, perhaps?—we have a cloud. Once again, doesn't this detail, too, evoke some wonderful clouds from elsewhere in the Bible? The pillar of cloud leading God's people through the wilderness comes to mind, along with the cloud filling the tabernacle/temple with God's glory, the cloud covering Mt. Sinai, and so on. Clouds often appear when God is leading his people, present with them in a special way, doing something magnificent for them.

What does all of this mean for the ascension of Jesus? It may feel like an ending, but the ascension is really a beginning. It may seem like Jesus is done working, but he's still very much doing and teaching. It may seem like Jesus is leaving, but he'll now be present with his people in a whole new way, closer than ever. Much like the effect of fog, only the visibility changes. The crucified-yet-risen Christ will now be teaching and feeding his people throughout the wilderness of this life, leading us through every trial and affliction to our glorious promised land. That's a big deal indeed!
