

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The Raising of Lazarus

Have you ever noticed some of the similarities between the raising of Lazarus and the raising of Jesus? One of my students recently pointed out a few of them and wondered why that may be, so let's take a look at some of those and think through what their significance is for the Christian faith.

The first thing that strikes me about the raising of Lazarus is that some of the same details surrounding Lazarus' resurrection are repeated again in John's account of Jesus' resurrection. The "stone," for example, is mentioned in both narratives, along with its being taken away (Jn. 11:41; 20:1). Just as Lazarus was "bound" with linen strips (Jn. 11:44), so also will the body of Jesus be "bound" with linen cloths shortly thereafter (Jn. 19:40). Again, John notes that the face of Lazarus was wrapped up in a cloth (Jn. 11:44), and the only other time in John's gospel where this same Greek term for "facecloth" occurs is at the tomb of the resurrected Jesus (Jn. 20:7).

On top of this, if we zoom out just a bit beyond the moment of the actual raising of Lazarus, we can see even more parallels between these two individuals. For example, just as Jesus "lifted up his eyes" and said a prayer to his Father before raising Lazarus (Jn. 11:41–42), so also will Jesus lift up his eyes in prayer to his Father on the night he is

betrayed (Jn. 17:1). Again, just as Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead by crying out with a loud voice (Jn. 11:43), so also will he cry out with a loud voice again before he is put to death.

What are we to make of all this? For starters, I think it's fair to say that the raising of Lazarus is a *foreshadowing* of the raising of Jesus. In this way, the raising of Lazarus is a kind of foretaste of an even greater raising that will soon take place with Jesus himself.

At the same time, the similarities between the two accounts also show that the raising of Lazarus is inseparable from the raising of Jesus, like two sides of the same coin. Lazarus receives life after death only because Jesus triumphs with his life after death, becoming, as the apostle Paul puts it, "the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Cor. 15:20).

And that leads to another biggie for the Christian faith: in Lazarus we see *a picture of what will happen* to *all those who believe in Christ*. The resurrection is not only a promise made to all Christians, but what will happen to us has already been demonstrated to us, and that quite vividly in the example of Lazarus. Yes, Lazarus is most certainly our "brother," as the narrative repeatedly refers to him, because we, too, are in the same resurrected family with him as those who live and believe in the One who is the resurrection and the life (Jn. 11:25).


