



First Psalm's First

In less than two weeks we'll have the privilege of hosting Dr. Timothy Saleska, son of CBI's founder and first director, Dr. John Saleska. He currently teaches at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and has written extensively on the book of psalms. Our seminar

with him on October 13th should be a great event!

I've been reflecting lately on the very first psalm. Of all the psalms we have in the Bible—the book of psalms contains 150 total, and there are several other psalms in other books of Scripture—I've been wondering why Psalm 1 was placed first. Some earlier interpreters (including Martin Luther) have remarked that Psalm 1 may serve as a kind of introduction to the book of psalms, but in what sense may that be the case?

The psalm begins like this: "Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night" (Ps. 1:1-2).

By having this psalm first, the first word of the whole book of psalms is "blessed." Throughout this psalm and the ones to follow, you will see what the blessed life looks like. Far more than just health and wealth, the blessed life revolves around repentance and forgiveness (e.g., Psalms 32 and 51), sorrow and thanksgiving (e.g., Psalms 6 and 138), and even frustration and reflection (Psalms 4 and 49).

In addition, the blessed life consists of meditating day and night on the law (lit., "Torah") of the Lord (vs. 2). Only by meditating day and hight on the law (nt., "Torah") of the Lord (vs. 2). Only by meditating on the words of the Lord am I able to see the fullness of the relationship I have with God. It is one that includes both the regular conviction of sin, as well as the repeated promises of forgiveness. It gives a framework for dealing with despair, and reasons for praise even in the midst of it. In short, meditating on the word of the Lord yields exactly what the book of psalms contains: the life of faith on every part of the spectrum, like an anatomy of the soul that knows us better than we know ourselves us better than we know ourselves.

Finally, I find it interesting that the first word of Psalm 1 in Hebrew begins with the *first* letter of the Hebrew alphabet, while the last word of Psalm 1 in Hebrew begins with the *last* letter of the Hebrew alphabet. Some would say that's just a coincidence, but I'm not so sure. It seems to me that Psalm 1 goes from "A to Z," as it were, speaking to the blessed life in the here and now ("He *is* like a tree..." [vs. 3]) all the way to the last day ("the wicked will not stand *in the judgment...*" [vs. 5]). In this way, Psalm 1 sets in motion how the whole book of psalms places our sin and repentance, our joys and our sorrows, etc., into the wider context of our eternal life with God. As Psalm 23 beautifully puts it, even if I walk in the here and now through the valley of the shadow of death, I will one day dwell in the house of the Lord forever!
